Despite the growth through the years, the SPCA of Texas' commitment to North Texas animals has remained our guiding light. But none of it would have been possible without your help! LET'S FIX THIS Southern Dallas Pet Initiative

The SPCA of Texas works with our community to keep pets in their homes, off the streets and out of shelters through our comprehensive Community Pet Program. The program was created in 2016 and provides a variety of services to assist underserved communities.

The Southern Dallas Pet Initiative provides free spay/neuter services to pets in 23 southern Dallas zip codes, as well as hosts Community Wellness Events with free vaccinations and wellness exams. From April 2017 through December 2018 the program also served dogs seized from Animal Cruelty Investigations in the 23 zip codes which added 244 surgeries. Beginning in December 2018 we went from servicing dogs and cats to only dogs. This program is made possible because of you, our generous donors, funders and supporters.

Our **Animal Cruelty Investigations Unit** (ACI Unit) serves the North Texas community by investigating reports of animal cruelty such as abuse, neglect, hoarding, animal fighting and more.

Saving Lives

When Animal Cruelty Investigators from the SPCA of Texas arrived at a self-described “sanctuary” for animals back in April, they instead found extensive animal cruelty.

Together with the Van Zandt County Sheriff’s Office and the Van Zandt County Constables Office, investigators found dozens of deceased horses as well as 70 horses, nine donkeys and six pigs. All of them had minimal to no access to food or water. More than half of the horses, the donkeys and the longhorn were roaming on a large, fenced pasture on the property. These animals had no access to food and little to no access to water. Other horses were confined to two smaller pastures on the property with no access to food and minimal water. The horses were so desperate for nourishment that they were eating the bark off of the trees, leaving some trees completely bare of bark. The pigs were confined to a small wire pen with no access to food.

The surviving animals had numerous health issues, including malnourishment, open sores, nasal discharge, diarrhea, hair loss, overgrown and cracked hooves, fly bites and other injuries.

The SPCA of Texas received custody of the 86 surviving animals later that month. Thanks to the combined efforts of our Animal Cruelty Investigations Unit, law enforcement, staff, volunteers and generous donors, these animals are now healthy and happy. As of April 2019 only a handful of horses from this case are looking for their forever homes.

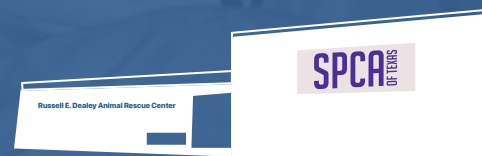

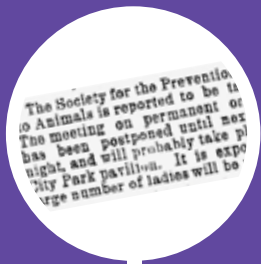

Since 1938...

The Dallas Animal Protective League opened a shelter on Industrial Boulevard (now Riverfront Boulevard), one block south of Commerce Street.

On May 16, 1973 the ground breaking for the new E.M. "Ted" Dealey Animal Care Center was led by "Anthony" a trained German Shepherd, assisted by Harold Clark, George W. Jalonick, III, Don Cates and Joe Dealey, for whose father the shelter was named. The new shelter was occupied in August.

On October 16, 1990 the name of the organization was again changed. The new name, SPCA of Texas, reflected state-wide efforts to stop the neglect and abuse of animals.



1888

On June 7, 1888, The Dallas Morning News announced an organizational meeting for the **Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals.**

1938

A charter of incorporation was granted by the State of Texas on September 22nd to the Dallas Animal Protective League (APL).



1940

1951



The Society for Animal Protection (SAP) was founded in 1951 by a group of interested animal lovers. The Overton Road Shelter was later built for the SAP with funds donated by E.M. "Ted" Dealey, President of A.H. Belo Corporation and Publisher of the Dallas Morning News.



1970

George W. Jalonick, III became Chairman of the Board of Directors. He and Joe Dealey, son of Ted Dealey, were the driving force for fundraising for the shelter at 362 South Industrial Boulevard. A development committee, headed by Russell H. Perry, President of Republic Financial Services, and made up of more than 65 prominent Dallas citizens, was organized.

The George Whittell, Jr. Spay/Neuter Clinic, which would later become the Myron K. Martin Spay/Neuter & Wellness Clinic, was constructed next to the Dealey Animal Care Center and opened in November of 1976. The first animal to be neutered was Sox the cat.

A merger with the Humane Society of Texas provided the SPCA of Texas a facility in McKinney.

The SPCA of Texas **enlarged its Animal Cruelty Investigations efforts**. Animal Cruelty Investigations help not only dogs, cats and small mammals but also horses and livestock.

The **grand opening and formal dedication of the Russell H. Perry Animal Care Center and Spay/Neuter & Wellness Clinic** was held on March 25, 2002.

The SPCA of Texas took over operation of the Village Fair Spay/Neuter & Wellness Clinic, now known as the **Mary Spencer Spay/Neuter & Wellness Clinic at Village Fair**, in Southern Dallas from The Humane Society of the United States (HSUS).

The **Jan Rees-Jones Animal Care Center, The Rees-Jones Foundation Education Center and the Myron K. Martin Spay/Neuter & Wellness Clinic** opened on January 2, 2012.

In December of 2014, the **SPCA of Texas purchased a building in West Dallas that became the Russell E. Dealey Animal Rescue Center**. Russell E. Dealey announced a \$1 Million naming gift at the Fur Ball Gala in September of 2017.

Celebrating its 80th birthday, the SPCA of Texas' Fur Ball gala sold out. The event, held at the Hyatt Regency Dallas, exceeded all goals thanks to Honorary Chairs President and Mrs. George W. Bush, Chairs Cindy and Jennifer Lindsley and Auction Chairs Julia Howard and Sandra Fite.

The Rees-Jones Foundation, the W.W. Caruth, Jr. Foundation at Communities Foundation of Texas, The Dallas Foundation, The Meadow Foundation and additional local funders awarded \$13+ Million to help fund the most ambitious spay/neuter initiative in the country. **Through the Southern Dallas Pet Initiative, the SPCA of Texas partners to provide free spay/neuter services to pets in 23 Southern Dallas zip codes.**

The SPCA of Texas operated a 24/7 shelter in downtown Dallas to house hundreds of pets of evacuees in support of the rescue efforts in the aftermath of Hurricane Harvey.

This year was a very successful year for our new Adoption Ambassador Program! We've more than tripled the number of adoptions from foster from 2017.

The Adoption Ambassador Program began in July of 2017 and has proven to help animals that struggle with being adopted out of shelters. The Adoption Ambassador program benefits both the adopters and the animals, by helping the adopters learn more about their future pets before adopting them and helping the animals put their best foot forward.

Foster Spotlight: **Carl**

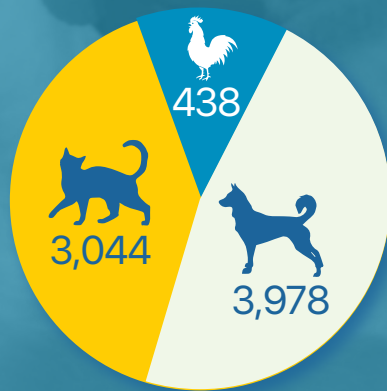

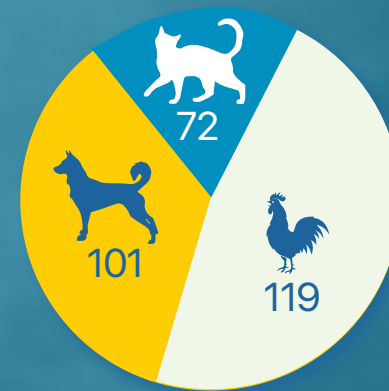

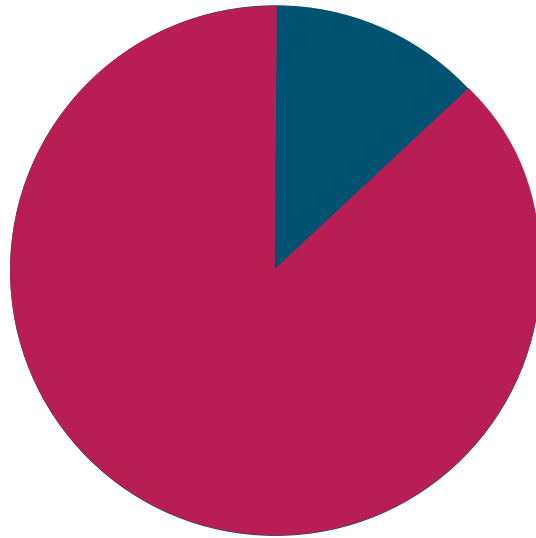
